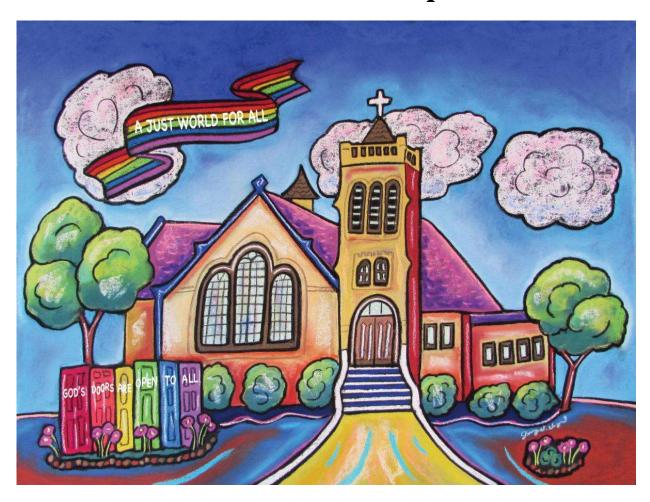

## PROPOSED BUDGET FOR 2024

The amounts proposed for each line item of the expense budget are based on last year's budget amounts and year-end total expense.

Some significant increases to note:

**Employees & Payroll:** increase in pay for both teachers also increases the cost for FICA taxes.

**Administration:** A budget of \$1,000 for computers and technology allows for adding, updating and replacing tech hardware.

## Physical Resources:

\$15,000 is budgeted for the Special Projects expense for replacing all water heaters with on-demand water heaters.

The budgets for Landscaping, Security, and Snow Removal have been increased to allow for costs of labor and added equipment.

#### Education:

Anticipated costs for Vacation Bible School 2024 will be about the same as last year, but without grant funding from Southwest Conference.

Additional programs for Education are planned for 2024 with anticipated costs of \$1,600 for supplies for training and activities for adults and youth.

There is an anticipated shortfall for 2024, with expenses exceeding income by about \$27,500. It is proposed that we will request this amount from the Foundation as an offset to some of the cost for Minister's pay and benefits.

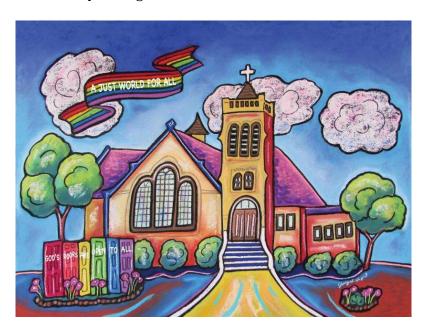
## **PASTOR'S REPORT**

There are also exciting things ahead thanks to the innovation and collaboration between Education Ministry and Called to Care Ministry to begin projects to engage our youth in service to congregants in need. It has been heartwarming to see the attendance and lively conversations taking place at our Perkins Hall gatherings on Sunday after church. Sincere appreciation is extended to Mary Davidson and the dedicated team from Welcoming Ministry that continue to create an environment that is warm and welcoming to all. Clearly, the wonderful refreshments provided are a centerpiece of that welcoming experience. If you have been looking for a way to contribute, see Mary to sign up for a week to host refreshments. Our Ministry Lead for Physical Resources, Tom Macy and his Cabinet lead partner for the ministry, Ed Znetko, along with their team member David Tyrell have been faithful protectors of our beautiful and historic facilities. This was the year of major projects including a roof replacement for our 30-year-old roof with missing tiles, and a major repair of the concrete areas surrounding the church that were in need of major repairs. As Pastor Jay frequently reminds us, we are very blessed to have a Foundation that guides the long-term sustainability of our church. The Foundation was able to fund the roof replacement and has made the final contribution back to the church reserve funds at the end of 2023. The expertise and dedication of our Treasurer, Julie McCurdy, has had a tremendous and positive impact on the discussions and decisions of the Cabinet. She is always patient and does a fantastic job of educating cabinet members on budgetary processes. Finally, on behalf of the entire Cabinet and congregation, it is with deep gratitude that the commitment and dedication to excellence in service for the past four years be acknowledged for the work of our Clerk, Suzanne Broussard. Please take a moment with me to formally acknowledge her outstanding service to the church.

As you know, the Cabinet also has three elected Members at Large who have just completed their one-year term. These Cabinet members have served as the voice of the congregation and have made important contributions this year. We have regularly relied on the security expertise of Holly Kassing and her leadership of our task force this year that has examined options for expanded use of our facilities by external groups. With our Visioning 2023 work as a guide, Holly and the task force have made recommendations to focus on offering space opportunities to non-profits who align with the church mission. As an active member of the Interfaith Council, Edie Diel let the church know right away when she heard that Temple B'rith Shalom had chairs available to donate. Upon hearing this news, Pastor Jay and our facilities team mobilized and secured the chairs with the help of folks from Temple who helped load them up and get them to our church. Those are the lovely chairs that now grace Perkins Hall. Thank you, Edie! Our third Member at Large, Dave Oliveria, has been actively involved in our finance committee and has helped the Co-Moderators create an organizational chart that we hope will be helpful to future Cabinet leaders.

One of the strengths and blessings of our church is the spirit of service and volunteerism that shines through in many new initiatives that were the result of vision and hard work of members of the congregation who had an idea and developed it into wonderful experiences for our congregation. All of this was done by individual who felt called to make a difference and stepped up to act on their ideas. For example, Melissa Gates and Ralph Mora created a Spanish class that has been very popular and was featured in the Southwest Conference newsletter. We have also enjoyed fun social opportunities in the monthly coffee house organized by Melissa Gates. We also had a fabulous performance of the radio show version of It's a Wonderful Life organized by Brian Moore that packed the pews. It was a hit for both our congregants and the wider community. Finally, a special thanks to Andrea and Aaron Smith for taking the lead on organizing a Friendsgiving for the church on the Friday after Thanksgiving that was a huge success that we hope will become an annual tradition and another opportunity to get involved to contribute to the work of our church. ## TREASURER'S REPORT

## 2023 finances in review

The 2023 budget was approved with a deficit of more than \$11,000; that is, it was anticipated that expenses would exceed income by at least that much. After several years of reining in the expense budget to the minimum requirements to keep our church financially sound, the intention was to live out our expectations for visioning and allow for new (or renewed) ways of learning, giving and welcoming. With this in mind, an amount of \$20,000 was designated for Visioning expenses.

The expense budget included a 10% increase to nearly all expense items. The increase was necessary to offset rising costs and to allow for more freedom in our expression of Ministry.

Although the budget included a line item for Visioning Expansion Allowance, most of those added expenses were allocated to their applicable ministry.

- Under Building Maintenance, there were additional expenses for the handrails for the chancel, new thermostats throughout the church, training sessions for the AED (automated external defibrillator), and repairs to lighting and coolers.
- For Fellowship, there were extra goodies for special occasions and monthly cakes to celebrate birthdays.
- The added delegate expense (under SWC support) allowed 5 delegates to travel to El Paso for the Annual Meeting.
- Vacation Bible School was a big undertaking which hadn't been done
  in many years. The expense for VBS is shown as an Education
  Ministry expense; however, we were greatly blessed to have that
  expense offset by a grant from the Southwest Conference.
- The Called to Care Ministry presented us with the beautiful new pastel painting of our church and purchased blank note cards printed with the image for sale to all. This expense, however, has been more-thanoffset with income from card sales.

At the end of the year, our expenses did indeed exceed our income—by nearly \$6,000. As, planned, this shortfall was offset by reserve funds held in our money market account. \$12,844 was spent from designated reserves in the Music Fund, the General Memorial Fund and the Lummel Bequest to cover expenses for organ repairs and concrete repair.

A special donation was received in 2023 for the purpose of establishing a designated fund for constructing a columbarium. The new Columbarium Fund has a balance of \$1,000.

In summary, the total income for the year was \$184,880 and the total expense was \$190,806. Expenses exceeded income by \$5,926.

#### CHURCH ADMINISTRATION REPORT

The ability for the church office to carry on when the pastor is on vacation or out due to illness is vital. There are a number of weekly activities that are necessary: creating and printing copies of the bulletin and bulletin insert; creating the weekly newsletter in Constant Contact and setting it up to go out on Friday; updating the church website weekly. The two programs we use – Constant Contact for the newsletter and Squarespace for the website – require training to learn their quirks and maneuver through their requirements.

There are always special projects to be done – constant updates to the church directory and picture directory; annual meeting documents and distribution; music reporting for streaming; producing calendars for the bulletin board in Perkins Hall; and responding to requests or other surprises that come along. Their volunteer efforts save the church a significant amount of money. Our thanks to Mary Beth and Jean!

## **CALLED TO CARE**

Called to Care Ministry has had a busy and blessed year. We added two new members, Carole Sue Linson and Chris Tompkins, to our ministry.

Ed & Sandy Znetko and David Pifer & Coco Lanigan commissioned and purchased a pastel painting of our church in rainbow colors by artist Jenni Willigrod. Ms. Willigrod gave us the reproduction rights to reproduce the pastel. We had 500 greeting cards printed using this image and have sold more than half which covered the cost of printing all 500 with proceeds going to the church.

A Prayer team was established in October. We pray for the church community and the needs of others. We meet in person the first Wednesday of every month.

A Friendsgiving meal was held the day after Thanksgiving this year at the church in Perkins Hall. This is an expansion from last year's dinner hosted by David, myself, Ed, and Sandy in our home. This year with many more attending and many more helping with food, setup, and cleanup it was a great success and may become an annual event. Thank you, Andrea & Aron Smith for all your work and leadership this year.

The month of December we will be doing acts of thoughtful kindness, gifting and sending cards.

I'm grateful for the Cabinet members who have been by my side this past year during my hardest days before and after surgery. I appreciate being a part of this church community.

## **EDUCATION**

#### **Education Ministry 2023 Annual Report**

2023 has been a year of growth and activity for the Education Ministry, particularly with respect to youth attendance and activities. We have welcomed several new children and families this year and our weekly Sunday School attendance is increasing. Our Sunday School program is going strong, led by our very capable and dependable teachers, Jeni and Audra.

Building on the success of our Youth Sunday School program, and funded by the Southwest Conference Sow The Seed Grant money we were awarded, we were able to offer a week-long Vacation Bible School (VBS) program this July, using a curriculum from Cokesbury and also introducing a theater element so that the kids could use the big stage in Perkins Hall. There were 12 kids enrolled. Jeni and Audra did an excellent job of planning and presenting the VBS themes and curriculum to the kids in a variety of fun and engaging ways. Several folks from the congregation donated snacks, costumes, and their time. We also had a generous donation of Bibles, so that each child was able to receive their very own Bible. Andrew Greenwald and Linda Foote led the children in the afternoons to help them learn and perform three separate skits with lines and parts for each, and props and costumes and stage set changes. The VBS week culminated with a theatre performance in Perkins Hall where the children performed three skits to an audience open to the public. There was excellent attendance and the kids had fun.

During VBS, Linda Foote also taught the children how to play the hand chimes and they played chimes during the performance. This was such a wonderful opportunity and the kids were so engaged that we got the kids together again for another youth chimes performance and small skit during the church service on December 17. Thanks to Linda for leading. Hope to continue the youth chime choir in 2024.

We continue to look for opportunities to get our children involved in the community and for them to participate in service learning projects. The children collected the "Souper Bowl of Caring" offering on Super Bowl Sunday and donated the money to the Yavapai Humane Society. For the month of August, the families of the youth in our church put together the PASS meal. Lee Danaher provided a tour of the Prescott Community Cupboard (PCC) facility in November for the families of the youth in our congregation. I will be meeting with Angela Imbierowicz in January to further discuss the possibility of our youth serving on the packing team for PCC in 2024. In December 2023, we went caroling at the Arizona Pioneers' Home and may make visits there more regularly.

There have also been several offerings this year for adult education, starting out with our CPR/AED training class held in April in Perkins Hall with 25 participants. New Life offered the hands-on and engaging training and each participant left with a card indicating they've completed the American Heart Association CPR Training Course.

Pete Norum led a Sunday morning small group discussion series on Marcus Borg and *Living the Questions* this fall. Pastor Jay has led several adult education opportunities throughout the year, including Lenten Studies, Zoom Faith Forum Sessions, and also participation in the video series, "When Black Female Preachers Speak - Seven Important Discussions with Black Female Theologians." We also did a four-week book study on mindfulness meditation, which was very successful. There is interest in continuing to meet once a month in 2024 to keep our meditation group together and to invite any others who are interested.

## **OUTREACH**

## Local/Regional Mission Projects/Programs

Coalition for Compassion and Justice (CCJ)
CCJ has transitioned from primarily being an emergency shelter. It now seeks to help homeless clients find permanent affordable housing in mobile homes, apartments, cottage homes, and lodge style housing. Dozens of previously homeless clients now proudly have their own housing. Rental assistance is available on the basis of a sliding scale. Additionally, CCJ works with clients needing counseling and help in finding employment. Together with the city of Prescott, a "Prescott Worker's Progress Agency" has been established wherein clients are trained and employed to perform landscaping projects throughout the community.
Discovery Gardens Preschool (DGP)\$750
DGP welcomes all children, including those who are developmentally challenged. Our donated dollars help support the needs of low-income families needing tuition assistance.
Freedom Education Fund (Prescott College)\$350
Prescott College's Freedom Education Fund was established to grant scholarship money to students hoping to "pursue the experiential and transformative higher education of Prescott College"—with priority given to students with the most financial need and who are pursuing social or environmental justice work in their degree or activism.
Frontera de Cristo\$945
An ecumenical border ministry in Agua Prieta, Mexico (across the border from Douglas, AZ), Frontera de Cristo provides shelter, counselling, food/clothing assistance, education classes, and job training for migrants choosing to remain in Mexico.
Giffords\$400
Giffords is an anti-gun violence, non-profit organization (based in Arizona, founded by Gabby Giffords) working to mobilize lawmakers and constituents in support of gun safety.
Launchpad Teen Center\$400
The Launch Pad Teen Center is an all-inclusive, youth driven and focused space, providing programming that is culturally relevant to teens in Yavapai County.

Museum of Indigenous People\$400
The Museum of Indigenous People (MIP) is the only museum in the Greater Prescott Area devoted to the culture and art of Native people.
Their mission: "To instill understanding and respect for the indigenous cultures of the southwest."
People Who Care\$400
People Who care is a non-profit organization providing transportation and other non-medical services at no charge to Neighbors in the Quad Cities who are no longer able to drive due to age, vision issues, or disabilities. This assistance enables those they serve to safely and successfully age in place, access essentials like healthcare and food, and enjoy an enriched quality of life.
Prescott Area Habitat for Humanity (PAHFH)\$600
With the help of the homes' future residents, PAHFH volunteers construct homes for those living at or below the Federal Government's Poverty Level Income figures.
Prescott Area Shelter Services (PASS)\$775
PASS provides shelter for women and children. Volunteers from our church provide a monthly hot meal, along with snacks, personal hygiene products, and laundry supplies. We are thankful for all of our PASS volunteers and to Patty Gard, PASS Team captain for the majority of 2022. Carolyn Christians has taken over for Patty in 2023.
Prescott Community Cupboard Food Bank (PCC)\$2,335
PCC volunteers have been busy packing and distributing food bags to individuals and families needing food assistance. We are thankful for all of our church volunteers who are a part of these packing teams. Angela Imbierowicz is our team captain assisted by Lee Danaher. Both Angela and Lee serve on the PCC Board of Directors.
St Luke Ebony Christian Church\$1,900
One way our Mission Outreach team decided to honor Martin Luther King Jr. was to help our Christian sisters and brothers at the St Luke Ebony Christian Church.
Temple B'rith Shalom\$400
Temple B'rith Shalom is a vibrant and inclusive non-denominational Jewish congregation that welcomes everyone interested in Judaism including but not limited to interfaith

families and LGBTQ members. As the oldest congregation in the Quad City area, they

seek to build bridges with the greater Prescott community and welcome all who are interested in learning about Judaism and seeking their Jewish home.
Yavapai Food Bank (YFB)\$607.50
Donations supported "Start Right," a program to assist impoverished families needing assistance with school supplies for K-12 children and youth. Additionally, we sent a check in support of the YFB "Family Christmas" program, which helps enable parents to gift their children with gifts at Christmas time.
National/Global Mission Projects/Programs
Christmas Fund (CF)\$1,375
This is an annual UCC special offering with donations supporting denominational retired clergy and lay leaders who are in need of financial assistance.
Neighbors in Need (NIN)\$480
NIN is an annual UCC special offering with donations supporting denominational ministries of social justice and compassion throughout the United States.
One Great Hour of Sharing (OGHS)\$690

Use of the building by non-profits groups has again increased.

We continue to acknowledge the age of our buildings and appreciate the concern it brings.

#### ON-GOING

David has been our landscaping person for the last four years replacing a twice monthly service the church was paying.

For the last year and a half, David and I have been our own pest control company. Previously, we had a company from Camp Verde that came out seven months of the year with mixed results. We dropped them and buy our own supplies with good results so far.

We purchased an AED device thanks to a generous donation. Several people were trained to use it and give first aid in emergencies. Hopefully we will never need to use it but have it just in case.

As you have tested out, we have 73 new-to-us chairs in Perkins Hall thanks to our good friends and Rabbi Susan. They certainly are an improvement over folding chairs. We made sure there were pads on all legs and purchased covers to make sure pads stay on. Protection for our hardwood floors.

We have contacted Molly at Prism about using space for some of their meetings with no response yet.

We have been in touch with the House of Hues about having events in Perkins Hall in 2024. They would be gay themed and 3 or 4 one day events. Nothing finalized at this point.

Signing at our Sunday services started out okay but has kind of fizzled without an explanation.

#### **REPAIRS**

New cover was purchased for outside sump pump in January. This, also, led to a complete check for leaks in our water lines.

The church organ underwent repairs in January to address several issues.

The piano was tuned in April.

The sound system board in the Sanctuary was reworked in January and is better now.

The kitchen refrigerator was serviced in July.

The irrigation system was worked on in April. Repairs were made and David no longer has to hand water our plants and trees. System was shut down for the winter in early November.

Our three coolers were started up in April. Water leaks were repaired. New pads were not needed but will be replaced in the spring. There were a couple of service calls for hose leaks during the summer. Shut down in October.

Furnaces, all seven of them, were checked and new filters were installed. The furnace in the scout room was shut down. Further examination determined there was not a problem. Technician erred on the side of safety. All thermostats in the church building have now been replaced.

The building structure was tested in October when an SUV malfunctioned and jumped the curb and pony wall in the parking lot. Driver was bruised but otherwise okay. Building had a few minor cracks around the window. SUV wound up being totaled. Building 1---SUV 0

## **STEWARDSHIP REPORT 2023**

Our 2023 stewardship campaign logo served as a reminder of how our gifts of time, talent, and treasure allow our church to offer a God of love, acceptance, encouragement, and extravagant welcome to all. We continue to hear from new visitors how life changing this message and ethos can be, particularly given our conservative city and region.

The year 2023 saw our continued transition to new members and attendees and the new energy they brought. Our 2023 budget remained cautious in spending levels as we – along with every other church – continue to adjust to the post-COVID reality. We continue to operate with many volunteers. Here are the statistics on pledges for 2024 and 2023 as a comparison:

As a comparison, 2023 estimates of giving totaled \$132,135 – 45 giving units representing 61 people. Pledges continued to be received through the year and the total increased to \$137,335.

The total income for 2023 was \$184,880 and the expenses total \$190,806. Expenses exceeded income by \$5,926.

## **FOUNDATION REPORT**

#### **Foundation Annual Report 2023**

The elected Foundation Board members for 2023 were President David Foote, Vice President Susan Lemons, Secretary Jim Christopher, Treasurer Jim Robinson, Alice Kring, Patty Lantrip and Sue Hodge-Parker. Other members were Ed Znetko, Chair of Physical Resources and Pastor Jay Wilcher. Effective November 30, 2023, Jim Robinson resigned as Board member and Treasurer. The Foundation Board appointed David Oliveria as Jim's replacement on the Board and as Treasurer effective December 1, 2023.

Our relationship with Red, White & Brew ("RW&B") as a tenant in our building has gone very well again in 2023. They usually pay the monthly lease a few days early and their business seems to be doing very well.

In early December 2022 we met with management from Hassayampa Inn to discuss problems with drainage water running off our property and creating some issues with their parking lot. During 2023, the easterly portion of the wall between our parking lot and Hassayampa's parking lot was cleaned to remove debris that prevented free flow of runoff water out to the alleyway. Late in the year, improvements were made to the northwest area of our parking lot, allowing improved drainage from that area, minor repairs were made to that section of the wall and a water collection box at the bottom of the wall was restored and the drain emptying the collection box was cleaned out to allow rain water to drain out to the street.

The Foundation provided a \$141.85 check to the Church from the Clay and Elsie Smith Memorial Endowment Fund for use in benevolences.

During the Spring, the Church decided to have roofing repairs done to the Church building and the office building. The Cabinet requested funding for this from the Foundation Board. After discussion, the Foundation approved payment of \$55,849.78 during the 2<sup>nd</sup> Quarter and consideration of reimbursing the balance prior to the end of 2023. The Foundation took this action to make initial payment of approximately 50% (the down payment), recognizing that the Church had funds available at that time and such action would not require either the Foundation or the Church to sell Mutual Funds that had gone down in value over the last two years. In late November, the Foundation was able to reimburse the Church for the balance of \$52,999.00. as sufficient cash was available from the RW&B lease payments that no securities were sold. This process represented very good cooperation between the Foundation and the Church.

At each regular meeting the Board received and reviewed financial reports from its accountant Amy Jaspers. For the quarter ending September 2023, the Foundation's assets totaled \$1,545,633 compared to \$1,446,704 for the corresponding quarter ending September 2022. The gain in Foundation Assets reflects the gain in the stock market during the last 12 months and income from RW&B. During that time, our investment portfolio varied significantly month to month due to the changes in the stock market.

The third quarter 2023 financial report (ending September, the most recent quarter) and the fourth quarter 2022 financial report (ending December, the most recent full year report) with assets, liabilities and fund balances are included as part of this annual report. Annual fourth quarter reports are not typically available until late in January, after the Church Annual Meeting.

The Board expects to hold regular quarterly meetings on February 15, May 16, August 15 and November 21, 2024.
