

FROM THE PASTOR

The fourth Sunday after Easter is called "Good Shepherd Sunday" because in each of the three lectionary cycles, the gospel reading invites us to reflect on Jesus as the Good Shepherd from the tenth chapter of John's Gospel. Psalm 23 is also included each year on this Sunday. The image of Jesus as "Good Shepherd" is found in the catacombs as a comfort to those being persecuted before Christianity became legal in 313.

Although most of us are far removed from being around sheep and shepherds, I think we are still moved and comforted by this image of Jesus/God as One who shepherds us through the ups and downs of this life and through the shadow of death. I am thinking of two women who needed a Shepherd this week - a young woman on a Southwest Airline flight and an older woman of 92 at her home in Houston.



Into your hands, O merciful Savior, we commend your servants Jennifer and Barbara. Acknowledge, we humbly pray, a sheep of your own fold, a lamb of your own flock. Receive them into the arms of your mercy, into the blessed rest of everlasting peace, and into the glorious company of the saints in light.

DACA PRESENTATION

On Wednesday evening, an audience assembled in Perkins Hall to hear three DACA college students describe their entry into the United States, the fear they awaken to each day, and the dreams they still hold. They each are pursuing college degrees which they hope will not only enrich their lives but will serve the needs of others in society. They reminded us that since their early childhood days, America has been the only home they have known. They spoke of values any American would be proud to hear. Love of family. Deep appreciation for the sacrifices their parents have made on their behalf. The worth of hard work. The gratitude they feel for living in a land of opportunity.

Myth:

- · "They are Children"
- "DREAMers use Chain Migration as the new Trojan Horse"
- · "They pay no Taxes"
- "Stealing our Welfare"
- "They're Criminals"

Reality:

- 16-37year olds (≤ 31yo by 2012)
- DACA recipients have NO path citizenship, so our parents don't either
- We pay Taxes
- Non-Resident Legal Status is denied ALL government aid (Financial Aid, Medi-Care/-Aid, SNAP, etc...)
- USCIS denies applicants who fail strict background checks

Contrary to voices which attempt to picture them as "illegals who only reap the benefits of American society without giving anything", they spoke of how they, like any American, pay taxes and obey the laws. They embodied how they contribute to and enrich society. There are more DACA participants holding college degrees than there are Americans their age who hold 4-year college degrees (36% vs 32%). They touched our hearts by their heartwarming stories of family love, loyalty, sacrifice, and the worth of challenging work. They "humanized" what often is only an "issue" at play in the world of politics. There are DACA information sheets on the mission table in Perkins Hall. Some facts will probably surprise you. They may even



awaken you to new thoughts about seeing immigrants as neighbors not to be feared, but to be treasured.

MISSIONS AND OUTREACH NEWS

Each month, we highlight a particular mission. Thanks to your support of our March mission project, a check for \$275 is being sent to the Prescott Area Habitat for Humanity [PAHH]. PAHH sends 10% of undesignated monetary donations to support a Habitat project in a Kenyan village. For the month of April, our mission
