# A Message from Rev. Dr. Michael Friday

#### Reflective Faith

Last month I challenged you about keeping faith. We all live by faith. The moment you get up and step onto your floor, you're exercising faith that your floorboards won't cave in and break beneath you. You get into an aircraft, unconcerned about the pilots' training, because you *trust* the airline has diligently taken care of that. During the flight, should you become nauseous, you take the pill the pharmacist gave you without checking to see if it's cyanide or poison. We live by faith. Not everyone we know lives by *religious* faith, but they live by faith, every one of them, and us.

Let's call those various versions of faith I've just described, reflexive faith, as opposed to religious faith. The two are not that far apart. We all live by reflexive faith: actions we take with little or no thought to inform the action. We don't debate the decisions; we don't pray about the actions; we just do them. Through habit, we've come to somehow know, even without thinking of it, that all will be well.

Religious faith, though, involves measures of contemplation, meditation, and deliberation. Religious faith can therefore also be called *reflective*. One kind of faith is *reflexive*, and another is *reflective*. But there is something that both share: *responsibility*. Whether you do something reflexively or reflectively, you should be responsible. Even though you get on a plane *reflexively* without checking pilot credentials, you do make sure to check in at the right gate and with the right airline to a selective destination! And even though a narrative in a holy book blames genocide on God, responsible people of religious faith know that there is never a reason to go out and slaughter people.

We Christians live by both versions of faith. Our Christian heritage trains us in reflection, whether it is in quiet times of meditation, or participating in corporate prayer while in public worship, or in listening to a sermon or in the debate and discussion of a study group or setting. This serves to better inform our reflexive faith, supposedly making our decisions more spiritually and biblically centered than our non-religious neighbor. The journey of faith, made by the characters of the Bible, or the classical writings of faith journey-makers like Chrysostom, Kierkegaard, a Kempis, Teresa of Avila or Catherine of Siena, Sadhu Sundar Sing, or Martin Luther King, Jr., offer ample fodder for reflective faith.

We assume that your pastor has been doing much of that kind of reflection during his sabbatical. My last settled ministry assignment came to an unhappy end two weeks after my sabbatical ended. This was due chiefly, to complications arising from some key parishioners' failure to engage in the same kind of deep reflection during my sabbatical (though encouraged to do so). Given that experience, I urge you, in these remaining days, to reflect deeply on who you are and whose you are. Do this, so to be ready to warmly and enthusiastically welcome back with readiness to continue this great ministry, the leader-partner God has given you. You owe it to him, to God, to yourselves, and to the city of Prescott and beyond that awaits your resumed partnership.

## **AUGUST MISSION NEWS**

Mission Outreach News: For August, our DACA Fund will be our mission emphasis. Donations will help our DACA family to meet their educational expenses. Franceny is continuing her studies at Prescott College, expecting to earn her degree in sociology/psychology in December 2021. Her older brother, Francisco, is a senior at the U of A. He has only 2 classes remaining before his graduation, either this December or next May. Franceny's younger brother, Fernando, will be pursuing his studies in Construction Management at Yavapai College.

Donations last month (July) went to the Yavapai Food Bank in support of their "Start Right" program. "Start Right" will host upwards of 2,000 K-12 children from impoverished families needing school supplies.

Thanks to your contributions, we support multiple mission projects throughout the year. This includes the on-going work of our church volunteers who regularly pack food bags for the Prescott Area Community Cupboard (PACC) and provide meals to the women and children sheltered at the Prescott Area Shelter Services (PASS). Our next PASS meal will be delivered on Wednesday, August 19<sup>th</sup>. Both Angela Imbierowicz (PACC team captain) and Patty Gard (PASS team coordinator) thank you for your service as volunteers.

On behalf our Mission Outreach Committee (Helaine, Berman, Becky and Bill Bryant, Patty Gard, Linda Moore, Staci Robbins, and Gary Gard, chairperson) thank you for remembering that we have been blessed to be a blessing. [Genesis12:2]

Update on other Church Mission Outreach projects. (1) The Prescott Community Cupboard reports that since the start of the pandemic in March, 3,730 food bags have been distributed serving 7,116 people. (2) The Prescott Area Habitat for Humanity is nearing completion of its 95th home for a low-income family in Chino Valley.
