FROM THE PASTOR

This week we come to the story of David and Bathsheba (2 Samuel 11-12). An ancient "Me Too" story that sadly sounds very modern. Our historic treatment of Bathsheba sounds very modern as well. This picture of Bathsheba "bathing" is about the only one I could find where she is not totally naked. Research into "bathing" practices of her time do not suggest a bathtub but rather a towel and bowl and not total nudity. But she is portrayed that way to help make her complicit as a temptress.

So a story of sexual assault by David becomes a mutual affair. One male commentator even suggested that when King David sends for her...she went! And that shows her mutual desire for David. Really? The king calls for you and you can respond with a no? We never hear from Bathsheba because as a woman she is silenced. Sound familiar? The cover of the weekly New Yorker magazine usually relates to what is going on in our culture. This week's cover has a picture of a woman's face with a red hand over her mouth. Bathsheba hardly gets a name in our reading this week - she is "the wife of Uriah the Hittite." Even being in the genealogy of Jesus (through her son Solomon) does not justify a name. She is only "Uriah's wife." (Matthew 1:6)

The subordination of women continues in our day and contributes to ongoing sexual misconduct and assault. Sadly, the church is often silent or complicit. Large portions of the Church teach that it is God's will for women not be ordained as pastors of churches. The use of our scriptures to subordinate women, justify slavery, and condemn the LGBTQ community demands a biblical response - and I will give it Sunday.

COMMENTARY: AMERICA IS IN PAIN

People who have suffered sexual trauma, who have spent significant effort shielding themselves from public shame, and who have sought healing from deep wounds, now find their stories painfully reflected on very public and highly politicized stages. Those who tell their stories, men and women alike, face derision, shame, humiliation, and death threats in order to let the world know what the men in their lives are capable of. Yet repeatedly those who have threatened them, abused them, told them to keep quiet, and dismissed them, remain in positions of power.



Further contributing to the pain of those affected, our elected and other high-profile leaders willingly filter the truth in order to expedite their personal or party-first ends. Political parties push ideological narratives with little to no regard for those affected in the process or for our shared humanity. The message received is that the cost of victims' truth is too high and not one we are willing to pay.

This is the message received by our children, too. It teaches boys that they can get away with a lot more than they might think, and it teaches girls that unmasking a male abuser can come at great personal risk. We watch this message play out on the public stage, and some of our nation's most revered leaders are reinforcing this message again and again.

I learned a long time ago how much courage it takes for a woman to break her silence. I learned as a pastoral counselor how critical it is for a victim's health and recovery that she be heard, trusted, and believed when she breaks her silence. Many women have been threatened by their abusers, and many times the threats come at a cost not only to them but to the people they love. Threats are as real as the trauma of abuse. If, when women find the courage to speak, they are ignored, dismissed, ridiculed, or become targets of public rage, we re-traumatize them and make far less likely they will speak up again.

America is in great pain.

Too many women are living in bodies that have been abused by men with power. Too many men are living in a world where their abuse of power is accepted, excused, and protected.

I believe.

I don't doubt any woman, no matter how long it has taken to tell her story, when she speaks of her abuse and trauma.

I refuse to respect the authority of any man, or woman for that matter, who has used his or her power to subdue a woman against her will.

I call upon people of faith to find their voices and speak out about the sexual abuse, trauma, and assault that have become far too common.

I call upon people of faith to find their voices and speak up in order to create a world where women who dare to tell their stories and break their silence are cared for, heard, and nurtured, a world where the men who look to us to shame their victims do not get the audience they need to protect them.

I call upon men of faith, men in power, and men in political offices to adopt a position of radical and deep listening to the voices of those who experience our use and abuse of power as a threat.

These are important steps we must take to heal the wounds we have all had a hand in creating. Healing will not happen immediately, but we must begin immediately to act. Anything short of this guarantees the wound will fester and grow.



DONORS DESPERATELY NEEDED!

Alan Michael needs a bone marrow transplant from someone whose DNA is an acceptable match to him. So far, in the entire world, that's right, WORLD, there is not one person on any national or international bone marrow registry who is an acceptable match for him. That's why we need YOU, and all your family and friends, no matter where they are geographically, and we need you NOW!

The test is simple. It's a cheek swab done through the mail, followed by a local blood sample should you be a tentative match to someone needing bone marrow, such as Alan, and should your blood show you as an acceptable match to that person, you donate your marrow at your local hospital.

If you are between the ages of 18 and 44 this process is free for you. If you are between 45 and 60 years of age the cost of the cheek swab would be \$100. If you want to donate but can't afford the cost, let me know and we may be able to find some financial assistance. So, if you're interested in donating, call me, Melissa Gates at 207-391-3276 and I can give you the information you need and answer any questions you may have. Don't forget to spread this word far and wide to all your friends and family because no matter where they are they can access the internet, get the testing done, become a member of the bone marrow registry and hopefully someone will match Alan.

For those over the age of 60, like me, the only way to try to donate is to use a private clinical lab for the cheek swab and that costs about \$195. The one thing about using the private lab is that results are returned between 3 and 5 business days whereas with the registry it takes 7 to 10 weeks for results. Again, call me if you're interested.
