SUNDAY JANUARY 3

This Sunday we will focus on Epiphany (January 6). We have a tradition of beginning the service with this collect:

Epiphany ("manifestation") is both a day, January & a season of the church year that ends at the start of Lent. Epiphany Day celebrates the coming of the Magi to visit Jesus, and these Gentiles illustrate how the revelation of Christ will come to all nations. As we begin a new year and a new journey together, we will ponder the Magi deciding to return home by another way. Sometimes life forces us to go down roads we did not expect, and sometimes we decide in January to get out of our rut and venture down some new paths. Either way, we need God to enlighten us, to help us have needful epiphanies to change our minds and ways. The Magi remind us to avoid Herod and all the schemes that would return us to darkness. Sometimes it is best to "go home by another way."

COVID has forced us to go down new paths. We are definitely going another way into 2021! Brian, Deana, and Ervie provide music. The sermon begins with the annual use of two reminders of how hard it is to change - "14 frogs on a log" and "a guy goes to a bar each day and orders 3 shots." Deana sings a version of James Taylor's song "Home By Another Way." JJ hangs out with the Magi in the front of the sanctuary and learns a thing or two.

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
JANAURY MISSION NEWS

The answers to these questions are easy: A steward is a person who, with regard to a property both physical and functional, keeps it, cares for it, watches over it. There is another question to be answered. Why give to our church? First Congregational Church occupies a unique position in Prescott. We are the only historically rooted and progressive congregation in the City that follows the way of Jesus. We are both open and affirming to all. Our sanctuary evokes historic church connections and the presence of God. The God one finds here is the One Jesus modeled for us – a God of love and grace. Many have given testimony to finding healing here from other church experiences, where God was presented as judgmental and exclusionary. Other churches have retreated to locations out of town. We have remained here on Gurley Street, downtown, easily seen, accessible and welcoming to all.

IMMEDIATE NEED

Another answer to why you would want to give to your church revolves around need, both yours and this Church's. FCC History

At the top of every list of members is one Woman. She always signed in as Maggie B. She was Margaret Forman Bashford Burmister. The daughter of Coles Bashford, former Governor of the state of Wisconsin, a member of the Governor's party, secretary to the first Territorial Governor, and Arizona's first Representative to the U.S. Congress. She was wife to Robert H. Burmister who, with her brother Levi Bashford, ran the B&B Mercantile.

She taught music and was the organist for the Church. There is no doubt in my mind that she was the driving force in this effort. Besides organizing our Women's Fellowship she was active in the History and Poetry Club and the Monday Club and also active in the Arizona's Federated Women's Clubs. Maggie B. was not able to attend the organizational meeting held at the Otis' home. She was confined at home awaiting the birth of her third child. Immediately at the close of the meeting a message was sent to her that the Congregational Society of Prescott, AZ had been formed.

Robert Henry Burmister was a merchant, a principal in the Prescott and Arizona Central Railroad, and a member of the first Board of Trustees for our Church; also in 1901 Mayor of Prescott. The Burmister's had three children and their home was, and still is, at the corner of South Mount Vernon and Gurley Streets. History of First Congregational Church, by Jay Eby
