Rev. John Dorhauer Named Candidate To Become UCC's Ninth General Minister And President, Written by Anthony Moujaes



The General Minister and President Search Committee has identified a candidate to become the ninth leader of the United Church of Christ. The Rev. John C. Dorhauer, conference minister of the Southwest Conference of the UCC, is the search committee's candidate, named Friday, Feb.13, chosen to lead the nearly 1-million-member denomination into the future.

"John is an articulate visionary who has a deep love for the United Church of Christ and will help us shape the future of the church for years to come," said the Rev. Kent Siladi, who co-chairs the search committee.

"I am deeply humbled and honored by the trust and confidence placed in me by the search committee," Dorhauer said. "I am grateful for the work they have given over the last four-and-a-half months. Taking nothing for granted, I look forward to meeting with the full board in March."

"I believe the Holy Spirit envisions a future in which the United Church of Christ matters," he said.

Dorhauer served as associate conference minister in the Missouri Mid-South Conference for five years prior to being called to the Southwest Conference and has served

Pastoral Ponderings by Rev. Ed

Lent -- That 40 day season, not including Sundays, preceding Easter, wherein the Christian is called to reflect about ways to let go of what hinders one's relationship with Christ and take on new ways or attitudes which draw one closer to God in Christ. So it is, not only about giving up, but also about receiving new graces. Psalm 51 is the classical "repentance" (turning again to God) confessional psalm of the Old Testament, attributed to David.

The "clean heart" of this psalm is a cleansing which opens us anew to Christ's deeper and larger intention for our lives. The traditional liturgical color for Lent (Anglo-Saxon for "lengthening" of the days in the spring) is the royal and repentant purple or blue.

Holv Week: Lent concludes with Holy Week, the last week of Christ's earthly life in the flesh, delineated in Mark 11-15, day by day, beginning with what we sometimes call Palm -Passion Sunday, that is, the Triumphant Entry into Jerusalem. Highlights of Holy Week: Maundy Thursday,

when we celebrate the origin of the Last Supper; <u>Good Friday</u>, when is remembered Christ's suffering and atoning death (At-One, breaking down the wall of sin, to open up eternal life and the possibility of an "at oneness" with God now and in the life to come, received on our part by an obedient faith); Holy Saturday, a time of solemn rest and reflection.

Easter and the Great Fifty Days of the Easter Celebration: The Resurrection of our Lord is at the center of the Christian faith and the hope that we may be transformed by Christ into reflecting his glory, beginning now and continuing until the complete renewal of all Creation. Best summary of this hope: "To the one who conquers I will give a place with me on my throne" (Revelation 4:21, Jesus speaking; a little read passage but an important one.) More about the Celebration of Easter later. (Easter is Sunday, April 5, a Communion Sunday, as is appropriate!)

I am glad to be part of these Lenten and Easter Seasons with you! Shalom.





A History of First Congregational Church Prescott, Arizona, By Jay Eby

It seems to me that the current popular history of Prescott would like to emphasize the wild west, Indian wars, mining boom town, and of course Whisky Row.

All of these are of course a part of our history. But, as the Capital City of the new Territory of Arizona, there was within our community a concerted effort to make our town a well planned civil place to live and raise a family. In spite of all the sin and distractions of Whisky Row, they did just that.


Our predecessors in the faith at First Congregational Church worked hard to make this happen.

They did it by example and action to bring churches, schools and culture to what was then a wilderness Capital in the Wild West.

First Congregational Church was not the first Christian fellowship in Prescott. The persons that formed this congregation had been in fact a part of other fellowships before.

All of the written histories of First Church start with:" First Congregational Society of Prescott, Arizona was organized with thirteen charter members on September 26, 1880, at the home of T. W. and Pamela Otis. This church is the oldest Congregational Church in Arizona and what is now the Southwest Conference."

Most church histories, including ours, highlight the buildings built, the Ministers that served, and the numbers of persons in the membership. These are important, but I




would like to celebrate those men and women that built and sustained our City of Prescott as a great place to live and raise our families.

Least we get to prideful we must recognize that our beginnings were with the cooperation and assistance of other congregations of faith that existed in Prescott before us. We know that Bishop Lamy from Santa Fe held at least Christmas Mass in Prescott in 1863. That that has been described as Sunday School classes were held in several buildings in Prescott from the beginning. The teaching was often augmented by Army Chaplains from Fort Whipple.

The first building in town specifically built for worship was on Marina Street by those that called themselves Methodists. A Baptist congregation shared this building for some time as well as a Catholic and Presbyterian congregation.

Prayer and Praise* began in the fall of 644° when The Worship and Education Team of Local Church Ministries began the "Praise and Worship Music Project," which included the Praise Song Songwriting Competition, as means of developing new musical content, and the creation of the <u>Praise Song Advisory Team (PSAT)</u>, a diverse group of musicians, theologians and worship leaders from around the UCC.

churches in rural Missouri. Dorhauer has a Master of Divinity degree from Eden Theological Seminary and a Doctor of Ministry degree from United Theological Seminary, where he studied white privilege and its effects on the church.

Dorhauer's candidacy must be confirmed first by the United Church of Christ Board of Directors by a two-thirds vote at its upcoming meeting March 19, then by the delegates of the 30th General Synod, meeting in Cleveland June 26-30, with a 60-percent majority.

The <u>18-member search committee</u> spent four-and-a-half months on the process to identify a candidate for the next general minister and president. They were seeking a leader who is "a person of faith, an articulate and theologically-grounded preacher and speaker, and an innovator who leads with clarity and purpose" to act as CEO and chief spokesperson of the UCC. Dorhauer would be charged with preparing the denomination for the future by planning, coordinating and implementing the mission of the church.

"The committee made its decision after careful prayer and intentional deliberation over the past months," said the Rev. Bernard R. Wilson, co-chair of the search committee and chair of the UCC Board of Directors. "We are enthusiastic about his recommendation."

Friday's announcement concludes a search process set in motion in mid-August, when current General Minister and President the Rev. Geoffrey A. Black announced his plans to retire at the conclusion of General Synod.

The committee has spent the last several months combing through a list of potential candidates, discerning and dissecting the skills and qualifications of each applicant. In mid-January, the committee interviewed its top applicants by web conference and met with the final candidates for face-to-face interviews on Feb. 12-13.

"We are grateful to the search committee for their diligence, for their commitment to the process and for the ways in which the Holy Spirit moved among us," Siladi said. "And we are grateful for the pool of applicants representing the broad diversity of the UCC."
