

Thanksgiving Remembrances By: Elizabeth Gates

When Julie approached me and asked if I would like to write something new to print in the Parish Caller, I said, "sure! What do you want me to write about?" "Thanksgiving," she responded. OK. It sounded easy enough. As I mulled thoughts over as to what to write without sounding trite or redundant, I took to the computer and googled "the first thanksgiving." Wow. What an education I received, and not a pretty one.

You see, apparently, the first official "Thanksgiving" wasn't exactly pie and Pillsbury. In embarrassment and disbelief, I learned that, in 1637, then Massachusetts colony governor John Winthrop wanted to celebrate the safe return of armed volunteers from a venture to what is now Mystic, Connecticut. While there, these men had massacred approximately 700 women, children, and men, all members of the Pequot tribe. ...what? I continued my research. The murder of the Pequot people happened almost 400 years ago. Interesting that the well-known story of the English settlers and the Native Americans breaking bread together in the 17th century only originated about 120 years ago.

I'm betting that, as you read this, you may be quickly losing your appetite for today's traditional feast of turkey, stuffing, and cranberry sauce. Stop! We take this opportunity to employ Dialectic Thought. The word "dialectic" means "something can be one thing, and at the same time also be the opposite." Dialectic Thought allows us to have more than one truth about something. To move away from black and white thinking into the realm of grays. Example: "I hate to eat broccoli" and "I eat broccoli because it's good for me." Or the more serious "Jesus pitched a fit and tossed the money tables all over the temple" and "Jesus quietly invited the children in the crowd to come to him, sit in his lap, and be held in his loving embrace." Comparing Jesus to broccoli doesn't even make sense to me, but the truth behind these examples is clear: there can be more than one way to look at something, or someone. Jesus (and broccoli) cannot be categorized as EITHER/OR. They are BOTH. Questionable taste and also nutritious. Temper like a pepper-pot, and also gentle and loving. Dialectics. Two truths.

Now we get back to Thanksgiving. If only out of respect for the Pequot nation, I think it behooves us to view Thanksgiving in a dialectic manner: the true origins of this holiday are pretty grim *and* it has evolved into one of the most beloved, cherished days of the year. I hasten to add that I would never disregard the hardships of our Puritan ancestors as they fought to stay alive in the New England winters, struggled to start a new life where they could worship God without persecution. They *did* have thankful celebrations of food after long periods of hunger and suffering, from whence Thanksgiving as we know it came to be.

Over time, for only the best of reasons and intentions, Thanksgiving has truly become a day of gratitude, love, family, and indescribably delicious food (including Aunt Winola's infamous peach melba). Can we really conceive of a life without Thanksgiving? No knocks on the door, no warm greetings and herding into the living room, no appreciative sniffing of the familiar smells coming from the kitchen... no carefully-set centerpiece... no kids' table?!? Over time, we have created a new -- a good -- Thanksgiving, rich in meaning and pure in intent. The gathering together of hearts full of gratitude and love, the warm smiles and soft laughter, the kids running around and the football fans whooping it up in the den... it's all good.

Once, very very long ago, there was a not-good Thanksgiving. In our innocence to facts we were not privy to, we unknowingly turned something around and created a beautiful, dialectic opposite. This year, we might do well to include the Pequots in our Thanksgiving prayer, a gentle reminder to each of us to treat all people with respect, and a reason to strive for the best and highest we can be in all aspects of our lives. Now... please pass the green bean casserole!
