From the Pastor

We have "adopted" Washington School next door. Our member Judy Ely teaches there. In addition, special needs children are welcome there, so this fits our theology of radical welcome to all God's children. Here is a description of the school from their website:

Discovery Gardens, Prescott Unified School District's preschool, offers a variety of services to preschoolers, ages 2 to 5 years:

Developmentally Appropriate preschool classrooms

Early Intervention services for children with developmental delays

The preschool program is Arizona Department of Health Services licensed. We follow developmentally appropriate practices and the curriculum is aligned with the Arizona State Standards for Early Childhood Education.

Children with special needs may also receive services in the following areas: speech/language

cognition

motor

social/emotional

adaptive/self-help

vision

hearing

Free monthly developmental screening is provided, including vision and hearing, plus diagnostic follow-up evaluations, if needed.

The Discovery Gardens preschool program offers child directed, developmentally appropriate practices in a center based early childhood environment.

If you are interested in volunteering in the classroom, please let me know. There will be an orientation in Perkins Hall Wednesday, December 10 at 10 am. The volunteer coordinator of the school system will be here to show us how to get involved. She will also do fingerprints at that time as well.



History of Washington School and First Congregational Church of Prescott By: Jay Eby

With the resumption of classes at Washington School it seems a good time to look back to early education pursuits in the Territory of Arizona. Arizona became a



separate territory of the United States in 1863 and Prescott its capital in 1864. There were not many children here at that time but the effort to educate our children was undertaken as soon as practical.

As Sylvia Neely told us in her Days Past article of 29 August 1999, Washington School was not the first school building on

the corner of Alarcon and Gurley Streets. The first building there was the Prescott Free Academy. The photograph shows the Academy building, soon to be torn down, with Washington School completed just behind.

The Academy was the first graded school in the Arizona Territory and the upper floor was used by the Territorial Government until the Territorial Capitol building was completed across the street, on the lot in the next block to the west.



There had been schools before, one of which was built and taught by Samuel C. Rogers and located on Granite Creek where the current Mile High Middle School is now located. A replica of that structure is at Sharlot Hall Museum for us to see.

Governor Safford, our third Territorial Governor, was effective in supporting public education and signed into law a property tax bill in 1871 dedicated to public schools and used his own and other private funds to attract qualified teachers to Arizona Territory. One

such person was Moses Hazeltine Sherman.

M. H. Sherman, a graduate of Oswego Normal School, arrived in Prescott in 1873 to teach and later to be Superintendent of the Prescott Free Academy.

I have no direct information to indicate that the Congregational Society of Prescott or the New West Educational Commission of the Congregational Church was directly responsible for this school in Prescott, Arizona Territory. Obviously the Prescott Free Academy did not just appear as the first graded school. The people of Prescott had, for some 12 years,



provided for public education for their children. Samuel C. Rogers, the first public school teacher, had organized a school district in San Jose, California years before to support his school there and helped organize such in Prescott. R.H. Burmister, later a member of the Congregational Church, and Will Buffum served as trustees. Surely some funds and much encouragement came from the Territorial Government since the Governor and his staff occupied the **Continued on page 2**

History of Washington School and FCC of Prescott continued second floor of the school building for some time. Many of the funds may have come from private subscriptions.

The New West Education Commission of the Congregational Church was busy at this very time establishing public schools throughout the southwest. By 1880 they had already established the Salt Lake School, the Santa Fe Academy, the Albuquerque Academy, the Pueblo Colorado Free Academy, and the




Las Vegas, New Mexico Free Academy. William Emory Hazeltine, a

member of First Congregational Church of Prescott a banker, and older brother of Moses B. Hazeltine, was on the board of trustees of the Albuquerque Free Academy. Mary S. Snyder was a teacher at the Albuquerque Free Academy in 1879 and 1880. She then came to Prescott, joined the First Congregational Church, and in 1882 married Will

she taught at the Prescott Free Academy.

Moses H. Sherman joined the First Congregational Church and was superintendent of the Prescott Free Academy. His sister Lucy Hazeltine Sherman, a graduate of Oberlin College, came to teach with her brother and married Eli Clark in 1880. Eli was a graduate of Grinnell College and taught school in Iowa and Missouri before coming to Prescott. Mr. Clark was a member of First Congregational Church, a partner in a saw mill at Lynx Creek, Territorial Auditor and later a partner with M. H.

Sherman in many development ventures. His partner at Lynx Creek was Amos D. Adams, a fellow church member who married Kate Dunning, a teacher at the school and also a member at First Congregational.



Angeline Brigham, a school teacher, graduated from Mt. Holyoke Seminary. She served as Master of the Young Ladies Seminary at Bridgewater, MA, and Precepts of Botterboro Academy, Vermont. She married Daniel F. Mitchell and in Prescott joined the First Congregational Church. While M. H. Sherman

was Territorial
Superintendent of
Schools, appointed by
Governor Freemont, he
asked Angeline to
develop a territory wide
graded curriculum and

serve on the Territorial Board of School Examiners.

In 1898 Duncan M. Martin, a member of First Congregational Church, was superintendent of the Prescott Free Academy.
