CALL FOR HELP

Dear Friends and Colleagues,

We are issuing a call to join in prayers and generosity for Pastor Tulafono Maga (pastor of First Samoan CCCTOLT of Wittman AZ) and his family (a total of 12: including children and grandchildren, plus Pastor Tula and wife Tuli).

On Sunday, Dec. 11, the Maga family spent most of the day at church until evening when they returned home to find their rental home engulfed in flames! Their home and contents were severely damaged by the fire that evidently was caused by a faulty bathroom ceiling fan in the attic, and subsequent smoke and water. Fortunately, they received some assistance for a hotel during the first week by the Red Cross, and their landlord will be working on reconstruction and renovation so they will eventually be able to return. They feel grateful to God that no one was hurt.

We are grateful to the Rev. Bill Utke from Desert Garden UCC, Sun City West, who has been helping during the first week to coordinate immediate fundraising efforts with the Sun City churches. While it is still difficult at this point to have a firm estimate of what the Maga family might need over the next months in terms of housing costs and replacement of contents/clothing/etc., we are working with a ballpark figure of \$15,000. We already have an estimate of a little over \$6,000 committed.

The Maga family has spent the week dealing with the trauma of the loss, plus trying to recover what they could of their belongings. They did not have rental insurance. They are hoping to find temporary accommodations in an Air BnB in the vicinity of the kids' school in Surprise, at least until the end of February when their landlord hopes to be finished with the reconstruction and renovation work.

This anonymous United States carol is often misattributed to Luther. The poem first appeared in a Lutheran hymnal for schools and families. The tune was most likely composed by James Murray in 1887. The original two-stanza form probably originated among German Lutherans in Pennsylvania about 1885."

*Hymn: "Joy to the World!"

Pilgrim Hymnal #130

by Isaac Watts, 1719 This carol was not taken from the birth narrative in Luke, but rather from Psalm 98.

Hymn: "O Come, All Ye Faithful

Pilgrim Hymnal #132

Adeste Fideles) by John Wade, 18th Century The invitation to "come, all ye faithful, . . . to Bethlehem" places the singer both among the shepherds who rushed to see the Christ child, and in the long procession of the "faithful" that have journeyed to Bethlehem in their hearts for over 2,000 years.

*Hymn: "Hark the Herald Angels Sing" Pilgrim Hymnal #120 by Charles Wesley 1739 This hymn by Charles Wesley, one of the founders of Methodism, is firmly wedded to Felex Mendelssohn's music. Composed for the 400th anniversary of the invention of printing, the music was adapted to this hymn fifteen years later.

Hymn: "It Came Upon the Midnight Clear" Pilgrim Hymnal #129 by Edmund Sears, 1849 Edmund Sears, a Unitarian minister, wrote this Christmas hymn emphasizing the social implications of the Gospel for his congregation in Massachusetts.

Inspired by a visit to Bethlehem, Phillips Brooks, minister of Holy Trinity Church, Philadelphia, wrote this hymn for the children of his Sunday School's Christmas service.

Offering of Ourselves and our Gifts

"Stille Nacht, Heilige Nacht" original 1816 melody, by Franz Gruber

*Hymn: "Silent Night, Holy Night" Pilgrim Hymnal #138 This beloved carol was written in 1816. Legend says the day before Christmas the organ broke down in the church in the Austrian Alpine village of Oberndorf. Other historians say the organ had suffered flood damage. A 97-year-old native of Germany pointed out that this church was in a remote village way up in the mountains ("Oberndorf" means "Upper Village"), and they could have actually been waiting for months for a repairman. We do know that the priest, Joseph Mohr, gave a new poem to the organist, Franz Gruber, to be set to music. Gruber composed the music, and it was sung with guitar on Christmas Eve. The original melody is slightly different from the one we sing today, with more embellishments, and the last two lines of each verse were repeated after Gruber. The melody lost its embellishments around 1834, when sung by groups around Europe.


Treasurer's Report on financial activity as of **November 30, 2022**

CHRISTMAS 1895

This photograph taken in 1895 is of a Christmas program presented by the young Chinese men from the school organized by Rev. McLean and T. W. Otis to teach the Chinese residents the English language.

We can also date the photo to 1895 since the baptismal font that was dedicated to Rev. Stephen Dubois Demarest was not delivered until just after the school was established. The kerosene lamps are still in place and the Women's Fellowship replaced them in 1896 with electric lamps. It is Christmas time and the greens are hung and they include a Star of David. The church pews that are still in use around our church are in the photo also.




